There have been no changes to the registration requirements in this reporting period.

There have been no changes to the classes of certificates or licenses issued by the CMRITO in the reporting period.

Description of change/improvement that would impact fair registration outcomes:

There have been no changes in the processes used by the CMRITO Registration Committee to assess the qualifications of applicants in the reporting period. The CMRITO has continued the practices that were instituted in 2020 in response to the pandemic. These include: 1. the expanded use of credential evaluation reports that applicants have already completed through credentialing agencies such as WES, ICAS or the Medical Council of Canada for the authentication and validation of program documents from organizations where applicants had completed their education. The expanded use of pre-existing credential evaluation reports for validation and authentication has continued to simplify the process for applicants while still maintaining the integrity of the authentication process. 2. The use of two additional language test options. These additional language test options are approved by the Registration Committee for use by applicants who are required to demonstrate their language fluency in English. • The Registration Committee approved the use of the IELTS indicator test. This language assessment test is offered remotely and can be taken from an applicant's home. The test includes four skills – Listening, Reading, Writing and Speaking and the same required test scores approved on the IELTS Academic and General Training tests have been approved for this test. • The Registration Committee also approved the use of the TOEFL iBT Home Edition of the TOEFL test. The test is identical in content, format and on-screen experience to a test taken at a test center and is taken on an applicant's computer at home and monitored by a human proctor online through ProctorU®. The approval of the additional online language testing options has increased the availability of tests for applicants as the TOEFL test is available 24 hours a day, 4 days a week, with appointments as early as 24 hours after an applicant registers and the IELTS test is offered every 2 weeks

Description of change/improvement that would impact fair registration outcomes:

There has been no change in the timelines for the registration, decisions or responses to applicants in the reporting period. The Registration Committee continued to see increased volumes of applications in 2021 as compared to the volumes experienced in prior years. The Committee continued to meet with increased frequency in 2021 to meet the demand. The Registration Committee continued the use of smaller panels of the Committee to be able to review an increased number of applications at each meeting. The Registration Committee also continued the electronic approval process for Decisions, Orders and Reasons on all applications that were reviewed, and applicants have been able to receive their decision from the Registration Committee in accordance with the published timelines of three to four months.

The alternatives the CMRITO has developed to validate documents, including asking applicants to upload photographs of original documents to prove authenticity, has been beneficial to applicants.

Registration staff received training on the registration requirements and internal processes to prepare an application for evaluation by the Registration Committee. Registration staff also attended training on the Regulated Health Professions Act, 1991(RHPA) legislative framework and the Health Professions Regulators of Ontario (HPRO) governance training for RHPA colleges. Ensuring that everyone involved in the registration process is educated about the registration requirements and understands the established processes and procedures, helps to ensure compliance with our legislated responsibilities. In this manner the CMRITO ensures that the registration processes are transparent, objective, impartial and fair for all applicants.

There have been no changes to the processes that have been established for the accreditation and approval of educational programs in medical radiation and imaging technology in Ontario in this reporting period.

Technological or digital improvements

Description of Change/Improvement that would impact Fair Registration Outcomes:

There have been no significant changes to the technological improvements that were made to CMRITO systems in 2020 in response to the pandemic. The changes that were made at that time have continued in 2021. The CMRITO Council has approved the Canadian Association of Medical Radiation Technologists (CAMRT) examinations in each of the four specialties of radiography, nuclear medicine, radiation therapy and magnetic resonance, and the Sonography Canada examinations in the specialty of diagnostic medical sonography, as the approved examinations for the purpose of meeting the examination requirements of the Registration Regulation. The CMRITO has agreements with the CAMRT and Sonography Canada providing access to these examinations for applicants approved by the CMRITO and for applicants who have completed CMRITO approved educational programs. Both the CAMRT's and Sonography Canada's competency-based, on-line examinations are administered by Yardstick Assessment Strategies (YAS) and use psychometric tools to ensure that the examination is defensible and that successful applicants are competent to practise the profession safely. Both the CAMRT and Sonography Canada have continued in 2021 to provide access to their examinations using a secure remote proctoring delivery model that permits applicants to write the on-line examination in their own homes rather than at an examination centre. This has greatly improved access for applicants who have not transitioned to Canada as they are able to write these examinations from their home countries.

Anti-racism and inclusion-based policies and practices

Yes,

Description of Change/Improvement that would impact Fair Registration Outcomes:

The CMRITO is a regulator that is committed to the values of integrity, respect, and trustworthiness and ensuring transparency, professionalism, and equity, diversity and inclusion in its assessment and registration processes. These values shape our organizational culture and are the basis of our decision-making and actions. In December 2021, the CMRITO Council completed its strategic planning activities for the organization's 2022 – 2024 Strategic Plan. As part of this plan, diversity, equity and inclusion is now part of the CMRITO's vision and values, as well as the first of three strategic goals. With respect to this goal, CMRITO will "actively monitor, evaluate and apply evolving regulatory practices to enhance public protection" by "reviewing [CMRITO's] existing programs and practices to ensure they support equity, diversity and inclusion." The CMRITO has implemented several measures to ensure objectivity in the registration practices and systems and identify potential sources of bias in the assessment or decision-making processes. Both external and internal legal counsel provide orientation to Committee members on various topics, such as the decision-making parameters set out in legislation and how human rights law interacts with Registration Committee decision-making. The registration requirements are defined in policies and procedures and are objective and have measurable criteria. Decision-makers consistently apply registration requirement criteria, policies and procedures to all applicants. Members of the Registration Committee are fully oriented to the criteria, policies and procedures utilized by the Committee and orientation is ongoing. Over time, the Committee has developed its own guidelines and tools to ensure that requirements are applied consistently and there are documented guidelines and tools that decision-makers use. Decision-makers consider previous registration decisions made in similar cases for consistency and there are internal processes to monitor consistency and accuracy in decision-making and the outcomes of those actions. The CMRITO has also developed systems to identify potential sources of bias and employs strategies to address bias and enable neutrality. The working documents that are used by the Registration Committee for the assessment of each application define specific objective criteria that are used as the basis of the assessment of each application. By using criteria that are measurable and defined and not based on any objective perceptions, the risk of introducing bias is greatly reduced. The CMRITO has implemented measures to achieve impartiality in its registration decisions and has taken steps to help ensure decision-makers identify sources

of potential bias and strategies to avoid and mitigate situations of bias from the registration processes. These include clearly defining procedures to follow if bias is identified and using group deliberation and consensus strategies to come to decisions.

The CMRITO has experienced a significant increase in the volume of international applicants applying for registration in 2021. Despite process and technology improvements that have been implemented to improve efficiency, the CMRITO determined that additional staffing resources were necessary to manage the increased volumes. Recruitment for the new staff position commenced in 2022.

There have been no changes to the contingency and continuity of operations plan in 2021. The CMRITO has continued to deliver all the services in each program area in a virtual delivery model. The Council and statutory committees have continued to meet virtually to discharge their legislated obligations. The information technology processes and safeguards to protect CMRITO systems have continued to be improved in 2021 with the introduction of additional authentication processes for CMRITO staff to access systems, and increased and improved training for staff on cybersecurity.

Description of Change/Improvement that would impact Fair Registration Outcomes:

There have been no changes in the documentation requirements for registration in the reporting period. In 2020, CMRITO expanded the use of credential evaluation reports that applicants had already completed through credentialing agencies such as WES, ICAS or the Medical Council of Canada, for the authentication and validation of program documents from organizations where applicants had completed their education. This practice has continued in 2021. As a result of the worldwide pandemic, options such as meeting with CMRITO staff to view original documentation or mailing of notarized copies were no longer possible. As original or notarized copies were no longer being accepted the CMRITO amended this process. As the secure document management website that is available to applicants applying for registration can accept files in a variety of formats, applicants are requested to scan their original or notarized documents and upload them. Applicants are also able to take images and photographs of their original documents and upload them to the secure site. Registration staff then validate the authenticity of the documents. Should any concerns be identified with any documents, applicants are requested to provide credential evaluation reports in addition to providing the scanned documents or images of the originals. In the event of further concerns, credentialing agencies such as WES or ICAS would be approached to assist. Where official documentation is not available, the CMRITO has continued to consider alternatives including personal declarations, sworn statements and confirmations and validations from former colleagues or supervisors.

There have been no changes to the language proficiency testing options that are available to applicants in 2021 but the expanded options that were made available in 2020 have continued to be approved for use. The CMRITO has a range of language fluency testing options that are available to applicants including: 1. Providing proof that an applicant's professional training was completed in English or French 2. Providing proof of completion of one of the following: • the internet-based (iBT) TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) with a minimum total score of 73, and a minimum score of 21 in speaking; or • the paper-based TOEFL with a minimum score of 500, and TSE with a minimum score of 40; or • the IELTS (International English Language Testing System) test – academic (AC) with a minimum overall score of 6 and a minimum score of 6 in speaking; or • the IELTS (International English Language Testing System) test – general training (GT) with a minimum overall score of 6 and a minimum score of 6 in speaking; or • the MELA (Michener English Language Assessment) test with a minimum score of 8 in each of reading, listening and speaking and a minimum score of 7 in writing. In 2020, the Registration Committee also approved the use of two additional language test options. These additional options have been continued to be available to applicants who are required to demonstrate their language fluency in English. 1. The Registration Committee approved the use of the IELTS indicator test. This language assessment test can be taken remotely from an applicant's home. The test includes four skills – Listening, Reading, Writing and Speaking and the same required test scores approved on the IELTS Academic and General Training tests have been approved for this test. 2. The Registration Committee also approved the use of the TOEFL iBT Home Edition of the TOEFL test.
